**Call to Worship** – 2 Peter 1:3-4 (Source: *The Worship Sourcebook*)

People of God, worship the living God today! Remember that out of nothing God created the heavens and earth. Remember that God raised Jesus from the powerlessness of death to the power of his right hand. Remember that not even the gates of hell can stand against God's purposes.

*Behold our God, who reigns now and forever.*

Hear the powerful words of the Lord, 2 Peter 1:3-4:

*His divine power has given us everything we need for a godly life through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. Through these he has given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature, having escaped the corruption in the world caused by evil desires.*

**May the Lord Give You Such Faith** – *Charles Spurgeon; 1 John 5:13*

What a blessed thing it would be to be completely resting in our Savior and securely standing on His promises. Oh for a faith that can sing through the night and through the winter! Faith that can live on a promise is the faith of God's elect. **In His Shadow** - *Joni Eareckson Tada/E.M. Bounds*

In 1967 Joni Eareckson Tada was injured in a diving accident at 17 years old, leaving her in a quadriplegic state with minimal use of her hands. After two years of rehabilitation, Joni re-entered the community with new skills and a fresh determination to help others in similar situations. Listen as Joni describes the words of the 1800's hymn, *Beneath the Cross of Jesus*:

*Beneath the cross of Jesus I fain would take my stand,  
The shadow of a mighty rock within a weary land;  
A home within the wilderness, a rest upon the way,  
From the burning of the noontide heat, and the burden of the day.*

I love singing this hymn because it reminds me that the safest, most secure, most peaceful, wonderful place you could ever rest your soul, is at the foot of the cross. When you are there resting beneath its shadow, you are quick to confess sin, you are ready to acknowledge weakness, you are confident that the devil can't reach you, and you are assured of the protection and provision of God.

I thought about this the other day when I read this heartwarming story written by E. M. Bounds. He says, "I'm a huntsman and I rose early one morning and heard the barking of a number of dogs chasing deer. Looking at a large open field I saw a young fawn making its way across the field. It leaped over the rails of an enclosed place and crouched within ten feet of where I stood. A moment later, two of the hounds came over the rails and the fawn ran in my direction and pushed its head between my legs. I lifted the little thing to my breast and, swinging round and round, fought off the dogs. Just then I felt that all the dogs in the West could not and would not capture that fawn after its weakness had appealed to my strength. So it is when human helplessness appeals to Almighty God."

I hope you see yourself in this story like I do. Like you, I'm just like that fawn. I'm running, I am racing to Jesus - oh, please help me. The world, the flesh and the devil are after me and I so want God to lift me to His breast and protect me. And, oh, what a wonderful assurance to know that when I am in the arms of Christ, when I am safe in the shadow of His cross, all the hoards of the adversary cannot touch me, or reach me or capture me... all because in my weakness I am so very happy to appeal to God's strength. Join me today, would you, at the foot of the cross, for it's beneath the cross of Jesus - in His shadow - that we find all the protection, all the safety, all the peace, all the rest and all provision you need for your soul.
